

Windstorm Exposure Overview

Windstorm exposures are considered those that are subject to hurricanes, named storms, or high winds. The degree of exposure is based on the distance from the coastline to the building site and the building code used for construction.

The coastline distance is generally the first consideration and is referenced in miles. The information is commonly benchmarked as:

Distance Degree of Risk

Coastal: Frontage – 10 Miles Severe

Coastal: 10 – 50 Miles Severe – High

Coastal: 50 – 100 Miles High
Coastal: 100 – 150 Miles Moderate
Coastal: 150 Miles – Inland Low – Minimal

The states most vulnerable to hurricane, named storm or high wind events:

Alabama New York
Florida North Carolina
Georgia Puerto Rico
Hawaii South Carolina

Louisiana Texas Mississippi Virginia

The states that have *high to moderate* risk to hurricane, named storm or high wind events:

Connecticut Massachusetts Rhode Island Delaware New Hampshire Vermont

Maine New Jersey Washington D.C.

Maryland Pennsylvania

Degree of exposure for these coastal states is further classified by First Tier (also referred to as Tier I) or Second Tier (also referred to as Tier II). The tier exposure is determined by the State and County. Any project located in Tier I will be required to carry windstorm insurance the entire investment period.
